CHISUK EMUNA LAUNCHES LIFE AND LEGACY INITIATIVE

I am very pleased to announce that Chisuk Emuna is participating in a community wide initiative called Life and Legacy. What is Life and Legacy? It is a partnership program with the Harold Grinspoon Foundation that assists Jewish communities across North America, to promote after lifetime giving that will benefit Jewish organizations, whether it be congregations, Jewish day schools, social service entities, etc.

The community partner for the Harrisburg area is the Jewish Com-

munity Foundation of Central Pa. After being invited by our local Foundation to participate in the Life and Legacy initiative, last year our Board of Directors voted to participate in the program. We developed a Life and Legacy team, which includes myself, Mike and Ricci Dectrow, Rick Friedman, Ivy Levine, and Rabbi Muroff.

Our Chisuk Emuna Life and Legacy team, along with other teams from participating congregations and agencies in the southcentral PA area, attended a series of workshops over the fall and winter, led by a representative of the Grinspoon Foundation, and Paulette Kieffer, the Execu-

tive Director of the Harrisburg Jewish Community Foundation. The workshops focused on the importance of legacy giving, how to have conversations with potential donors, marketing, and how to steward donors.

To assist the Life and Legacy initiative, the Grinspoon Foundation provides a grant of up to 50% of the actual budget to run the program. Incentive monies are also available if all of the individual organizations are able to meet their goals of having members commit to legacy giving.

Why is Life and Legacy such an important initiative? It is estimated that 20-30 years from now, Jewish institutions in general will be relying

Holocaust Monument Observance

The Yom Hashoah commemoration at the Holocaust monument on Riverfront Park will take place on **Sunday, May 1 at 11:00 am.** Participants in the March of the Living will share thoughts and the winners of the Schwab Holocaust Essay contest will read their essays. Andrew Casher, an 8th grader and member of Temple Ohev Shalom, will read a Holocaust-related poem he wrote. Teri Berman and her son, Sam Welks, will share the experience of their beloved mother and grandmother, Annette Berman, z"l, a Holocaust survivor from France.

Reading Of Names

On **Wednesday evening, May 4,** Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Memorial Day) will be commemorated with

the "Reading of Names" program to be held at Temple Beth Shalom, 913 Allendale Road in Mechanicsburg. This meaningful program will begin at 7:30 pm with a special opening service led by children from congregational Religious Schools and the Silver Academy. Following the opening ceremony, a vigil in which the names of those who perished will be read continuously over a period of 24 hours.

"Unto Every Person There is a Name" seeks to dignify the memories of victims of the Shoah, the Nazi Holocaust, by reading their names aloud. These victims were stripped of their names by their oppressors and tattooed with numbers. Through the public reading of the names of Holocaust victims, this program strives to restore a portion of their human-

ity and to retrieve them from the lost depths of anonymity.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

This Year in Jerusalem!



At the end of both Yom Kippur services and Passover Seders, we declare: "Lashana Habaah B'Yerushalayim – Next Year in Jerusalem!" For centuries,

these declarations have been among the ways that we Jews have reaffirmed the centrality of Jerusalem in our lives.

Jerusalem is not only a physical location; it is also a spiritual vision. Jerusalem represents a dream of future unity and peace – among Jews and between all people. As Isaiah declares,

For the Torah shall come forth
from Zion,
And the word of the L-rd from
Jerusalem.
[The L-rd] will judge between
the nations
And settle disputes for many
peoples.
They will beat their swords into
plowshares
And their spears into pruning
hooks.
Nation will not take up sword
against nation,
Nor will they train for war any-
more.

That dream is not yet realized; our world is rife with hatred and killing. Yet it is that dream which inspired my daughter, Tali and her husband, Jon, and their son, Amichai, to make aliyah last summer. There was no reason for them to move six thousand miles away from their parents – thank G-d, they actually love us as much as we love them – other than to be a part of the dream of strengthening the Jewish People, Israel and ultimately the world. As my children prepare to celebrate their first Yom Haatzmaut – Israeli Independence Day – as Israelis, I find myself appreciating more than ever the miracle of our People's return to sovereignty in the Land of Israel in our day.



It is always "next year in Jerusalem". Even in Jerusalem, Jews declare, "Next year in Jerusalem, rebuilt!" Yet what about this year?

This year, indeed this month, I am heading to Jerusalem – as a parent visiting children and as a Jew returning home to pray, study Torah, walk the Land of Israel and encounter people in all of their diversity. I am grateful to live at a time when the Jewish People have returned to our ancient-new homeland. But it is even more than that as Professor Emil Fackenheim long ago argued in his book, *The Jewish Return Into History: Reflections in the Age of Auschwitz and a New Jerusalem*. We have come home in both time and space. Even with all of the challenges, we need not wait until next year to go to Jerusalem – physically and spiritually – even if the entire dream is not yet reality.

This month, as we observe Yom Hashaoah, mourning the Six Million who were murdered in the Shoah and Yom Hazikkaron, (Memorial Day) mourning the thousands of Israelis who have been killed defending the State of Israel and celebrate Yom Ha'atzmaut – Israel's 68th Independence Day, let us take our people's return to history and land personally.

When we conclude with declarations about Jerusalem on seder nights and Yom Kippur, we demonstrate that we are a people con-

cerned about where and what we are leaving and also where we are going. Rabbi Jonathan Sacks teaches that "to be a Jew is to join the journey of our people... the long walk across centuries and continents from exile to homecoming. There is no story like it, and the journey is not yet complete."

So, where are you on your journey? What can we do individually and together to strengthen our bonds to the People, Land and State of Israel? Perhaps plan a Chisuk Emuna family trip to Israel? Study something related to the history and contemporary realities of Israel? Sample Israeli culture – dance, song, art, food, Hebrew? Join efforts in our community to support Israel through advocacy, tzedakah and investment, e.g. Israel Bonds?

CONGREGANTS SUPPORT FRIENDS OF IDF

In June of 2015, many Chisuk Emuna congregants attended a viewing of Nancy Spielberg's documentary, "Above and Beyond." Following that screening we initiated a campaign to raise money for Friends of the Israel Defense Forces (FIDF). Many of you contributed and we raised a little over \$22,000!

Recently we received a letter from Tzvia Wexler, Executive Director of the PA and NJ chapters of the FIDF, informing us of how that money was used through the FIDF DIGNITY Program and the impact it made on the soldiers serving the State of Israel. We'd like to share that information with you.

- 125 soldiers received vouchers at Rosh Hashanah in the amount of approximately \$130 each.
- 5 refrigerators were purchased at approximately \$625 each
- 5 washing machines were purchased at approximately \$275 each
- 5 twin beds were purchased at approximately \$255 each
